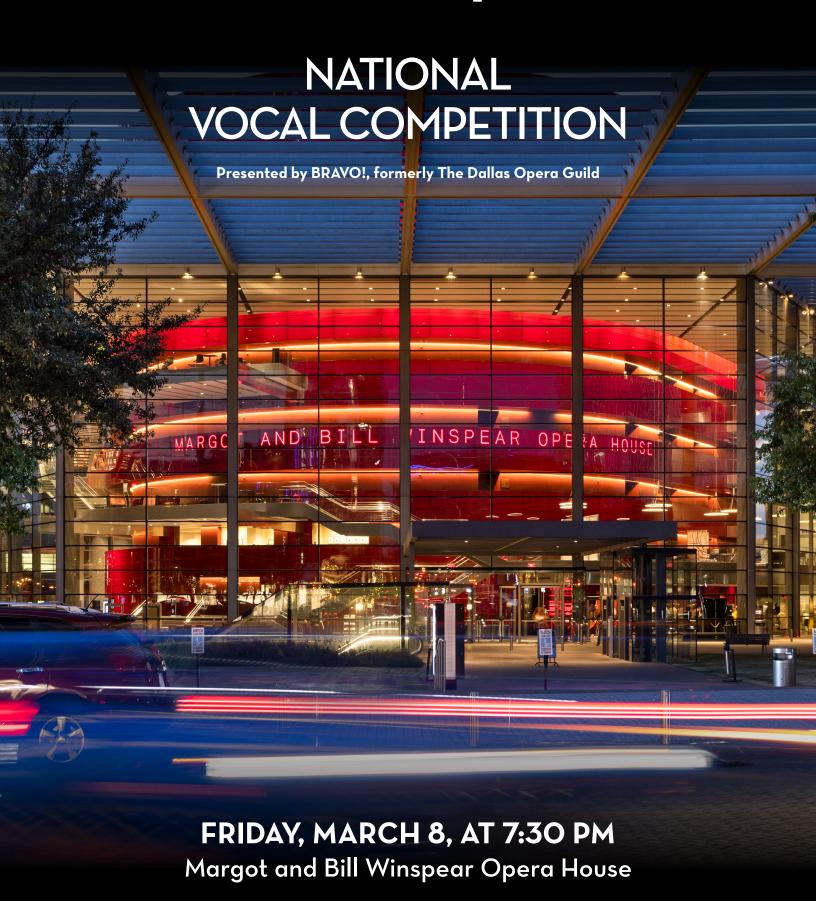

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND GENERAL DIRECTOR AND CEO

Identifying and rewarding emerging artists must be a top priority for any opera company, for without a steady stream of gifted, impeccably trained young singers, the art form we love has no future. It has been The Dallas Opera's privilege over the decades to meet the stars of the next generation for the first time through this competition and then to witness their growth and see them perform on our main stage. A prime example is Marjorie Owens, the first prize and People's Choice winner in 2002, who set the stage on fire in the title role of *Elektra* this season!

The Dallas Opera National Vocal Competition is especially attractive to singers because they perform on the main stage, partnered and supported by The Dallas Opera Orchestra. Not every competition features a full orchestra, but we choose to do it because most opera singers spend most of their time onstage performing with one. Many industry professionals attend competitions and act as judges, so this is a chance for the singers to be seen and heard by people who can make a difference in their careers. And the cash awards are significant! Opera is an expensive career choice, and when a singer is starting out, a cash award can make a huge difference in helping to pay for teachers and coaches, and for travel to auditions.

Opera has always been about the human voice—first, last, and always—and it is the only absolute requirement for opera to exist. After tonight's competition, we think you'll agree that the future of opera is in very good hands.

COMPETITION JUDGES

David Lomelí | Chair



David Lomelí became the first Latino in US history to occupy a top artistic position at a Level 1 opera company when he was named the Director of Artistic Administration at The Dallas Opera in 2018. In September 2019, he joined the team at the historic Bavarian State Opera in Munich where he took part in casting more than 30 new productions and 50 revival productions for the 2021–2025 seasons, becoming the first Hispanic to hold

the position of Head of Casting in a top five company in the world. In April 2021, he joined the Santa Fe Opera in a newly created position as Chief Artistic Officer, overseeing the company's artistic output. After a full calendar year with the company and managing the 2021 and 2022 festivals, Santa Fe Opera won "Festival of the Year" at the International Opera Awards in November 2022. During his time with The Dallas Opera, Lomelí was involved in the commissioning and producing of five world premieres and facilitated the debuts of major International and US stars. He is most proud of his work with The Dallas Opera's Hart Institute for Women Conductors (HIWC), where he and his team recruited over 400 conductors and 50 administrators with applications spanning more than 30 countries. During the pandemic, Lomelí and his team created the TDO Network for The Dallas Opera, which generated millions of views on the company's social media channels.

Before joining TDO, Mr. Lomelí performed as a world-renowned tenor with many top leading companies. He is a recipient of the National Youth Prize in the Arts, presented by the Mexican government, and won first prize in both categories of opera and zarzuela in Plácido Domingo's 2006 Operalia. Mr. Lomelí is an alumnus of some of the most prestigious training programs for opera artists, including the Domingo-Colburn-Stein Young Artist Program at LA Opera, the Merola Opera Program, and Adler Fellowship at the San Francisco Opera, as well as the International Society of Mexican Art and Values in Mexico City.



Paul Hopper



Paul Hopper recently joined LA Opera as Senior Director, Artistic Planning. His duties include overseeing all casting for the company and serving as the artistic and strategic head of the company's Domingo-Colburn-Stein Young Artist Program. For the five seasons before, he was the Associate Artistic Administrator at The Metropolitan Opera where he oversaw the casting of secondary roles and covers for all productions. Previously, he was the Assistant

Artistic Director at Houston Grand Opera where he assisted in long term artistic planning and casting, managed special artistic initiatives, and guided a variety of audiences in learning more about opera, including numerous events in support of the company's first Ring Cycle. As principal dramaturg for the company he worked closely with composers and librettists in the commissioning and development of new works. He regularly serves on the juries for international vocal competitions, including the Metropolitan Opera's Eric and Dominique Laffont Competition, the Queen Sonja International Music Competition, the International Hans Gabor Belvedere Singing Competition, and the Tenor Viñas Competition. A graduate of the Eastman School of Music and the University of Houston, Paul is also Artistic Advisor for the Lakes Area Music Festival. He previously held positions at the Santa Fe Opera and ADA Artist Management.

Andreas Melinat



Andreas Melinat is Vice President, Artistic Planning at Lyric Opera of Chicago where he collaborates with general director Anthony Freud and music director Enrique Mazzola on Lyric's repertoire and casting. He is responsible for negotiating the contracts of the principal singers, conductors, directors, and choreographers engaged by the company. He also participates in the selection of the young artists of The Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan

Opera Center. He regularly hears auditions in America and Europe on behalf of the company and has served on the jury for many vocal competitions, including the Metropolitan Opera Laffont Competition as well as those sponsored by the Richard Tucker Music Foundation, the Dallas Opera Guild, the Opera Guild of Dayton, Young Texas Artists, the Jensen Foundation, and for the Marian Anderson Award. He has served as a panelist for OPERA America and the Merola Opera Program at San Francisco Opera. Before joining Lyric in 2000, Mr. Melinat worked for seven years in the vocal division at Columbia Artists Management Inc. where he eventually reached the position of vice president and artist manager. Mr. Melinat received his B.A. with honors in economics from Harvard.

Nicole Paiement



As founder and artistic director of San Francisco's Opera Parallèle, Nicole Paiement has conducted world premieres of Lou Harrison's final version of Young Caesar; Dante De Silva's Gesualdo, Prince of Madness; Luciano Chessa's opera A Heavenly Act; the chamber version of John Harbison's The Great Gatsby; the premiere of the re-orchestration of Terence Blanchard's Champion in collaboration with SFJAZZ Center; West

Coast premieres of John Rea's re-orchestration of Berg's Wozzeck and Philip Glass's Orphée; Thomson's Four Saints in Three Acts; Osvaldo Golijov's Ainadamar; Poulenc's Les mamelles de Tiresias; and Weill's Mahagonny Songspiel. American premieres include Adam Gorb's Anya 17 and Tarik O'Regan's Heart of Darkness. At Opera Parallèle this season, she conducted the world premiere of The Emissary, by Kenji Oh and Kelley Rourke, and in April she will conduct Birds & Balls at SFJAZZ. She will debut with the Vienna Volksoper in June, conducting a symphonic concert and The Gospel According to the Other Mary by John Adams.

Kristian Roberts



Kristian Roberts is an arts leader, educator, and speaker with a passion for mentorship and cultivating young talent both on and off the stage. Ms. Roberts is the Director of Education at The Dallas Opera designing and overseeing programs to provide multi-layered learning experiences for students, adults, and a team of performing and teaching artists. In addition to her 16 years with TDO's Education Department, Kristian is co-host for the

company's outdoor simulcasts and has performed on the main stage as a member of The Dallas Opera Chorus. She was also co-host of the virtual series *Taking the Stage with Kristian and Quo*, where she engaged audiences in conversations about community, EDI, business practices, humanity, and the ways in which all of these tie directly into art and art-making. Kristian serves on the Advisory Board and Arts Council for Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts and OPERA America's Racial Justice Opera Network Steering Committee. She has served as a judge for National Association of Negro Musicians Vocal Competition, The Donald W. Wood, Sr. Vocal Competition, and Booker T. Washington HSPVA Aria Competition. Ms. Roberts holds a master's degree in vocal performance from Southern Methodist University, with additional studies in music history, and a bachelor's degree in vocal performance from Baylor University.

CONDUCTOR AND **HOST**

Paolo Bressan | Conductor



"An ecstatic and talented showman who propelled the responsive orchestra through a churning sea of emotions," Italian conductor Paolo Bressan is a committed musician and educator, as well as co-founder and general and artistic director of the LacMus International Music Festival at Lake Como, Italy (2017-current). Maestro Bressan has been engaged at the Salzburg Festival, Mecklenburg

State Theater in Schwerin, Mariinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg, and appeared at the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées in Paris, Vienna Konzerthaus, National Auditorium in Madrid and the National Music Auditorium of Mexico City. In addition to his long tenure at The Dallas Opera (2015–current) as an associate conductor, this season he conducts the family performances of *Pépito* and the National Vocal Competition, and served as assistant conductor to Emmanuel Villaume for *Tosca*, *The Diving Bell and the Butterfly, Elektra*, and the *People's Choice Concert*. He is also a master teacher at the Hart Institute for Women Conductors.

Golda Schultz | Host



A graduate of The Juilliard School and Bayerische Staatsoper's Opernstudio, soprano Golda Schultz released her debut solo album *This Be Her Verse* in 2022 (Alpha Classics, with pianist Jonathan Ware). Operatic highlights include Ann Truelove in *The Rake's Progress* and Pamina in *Die Zauberflöte* at the Metropolitan Opera, Madame Lidoine in *Dialogues des Carmélites* at Glyndebourne Festival Opera, Liù in

Turandot at the Wiener Staatsoper, and Micäela in Carmen at Opéra National de Paris. Key concert performances include Vier letzte Lieder with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Die Jahreszeiten with the Cleveland Orchestra, and Sibelius's Luonnotar with the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra. She was the featured soloist at the 2020 Last Night of the BBC Proms. Future performances include her house debut at the Royal Opera Covent Garden as Fiordiligi in Così fan tutte and performing in concert in Mahler Symphony No. 4 with the New York Philharmonic and in Brahms's Ein deutsches Requiem with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra.
